How many times in recent months or years have you had conversations that go like the one I had last week:

Friend: "You go to which church again?"
Me: "First Baptist in Jefferson City."
Friend: "Baptist?!"

Me: "Yeah, but we aren't that kind of Baptist."

In recent years, carrying the name "Baptist" seems like more and more of a liability. For those of us that grew up Baptist, were educated in Baptist institutions, or worked with Baptist missionaries near and far, it has often been hard to accept that the denomination that raised us is no longer hospitable to us. There is grief in that for many of us.

Last month, the Southern Baptist Convention met. One of the many things they decided was that any church that had a woman on staff with the title of "minister" in any form would be removed from the SBC. This applied not only to senior pastors, but also to children's ministers, worship pastors, and ministers of missions. Of course, our church's primary affiliation is with the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship, but church denominational differences are hard enough for insiders to keep up with; our friends and neighbors are often quite confused!

I lament that I must so often explain why I am a not *that* kind of Baptist. There is much in the Baptist identity that means so much to me. The centrality of Scripture, the autonomy of the local church, the historic commitment to the separation of church and state, our commitment to religious freedom . . . these ideas are core to who I am, and they are ideas gifted to me by our Baptist tradition. I find myself fighting to cling to these core principles while also rejecting what "Baptist" has come to mean in our modern culture.

On July 9, I will be preaching on our Baptist identity and principles. I invite you to reflect on what is valuable to you about your own Baptist identity, and I would love to hear your thoughts. Share them with your friends, your small groups, and your Bible study classes too, and let us reflect together on what is valuable about our Baptist identity.

HYMN HIGHLIGHT

He set my feet on a rock and gave me a firm place to stand. He put a new song in my mouth, a hymn of praise to our God. Psalm 40:2-3

I usually select a favorite or at least a known hymn to highlight each month. This month's selection is most likely one that isn't known, but is included in our hymnal, *Celebrating Grace*, #592, *How Can I Keep from Singing*. We are a singing people because the gospel of the Lord Jesus *compels* us to sing. It's what we do. Bob Kauflin writes in his book *Worship Matters* that, "worship isn't primarily about music, techniques, songs, or methodologies. It's about our hearts. It's about what and who we love more than anything."* God's love for us inspires our response of love for Him and calls forth songs of joy from our lips.

Even though Rev. Robert Lowry, Baptist pastor, poet and song writer, often said, "I would rather preach a gospel sermon than write a hymn," he lives on in his hymns rather than in his sermons. He wrote 184 hymn texts (e.g., I Need Thee Every Hour, Shall We Gather at the River), composed 471 hymn tunes (e.g., Amazing Grace, All the Way My Savior Leads Me), and edited 21 hymnals (many collections for use in Sunday School).** He wrote the words and music for How Can I Keep from Singing in 1869 and named the tune ENDLESS SONG. It is his personal testimony of being compelled to sing out of his love for Christ.

HOW CAN I KEEP FROM SINGING

My life flows on in endless song, above earth's lamentation.
I catch the sweet, though far-off hymn that hails a new creation.
Through all the tumult and the strife, I hear that music ringing.
It finds an echo in my soul.
How can I keep from singing?

My Savior still is living.
What though the shadows gather round?
A new song Christ is giving.
No storm can shake my inmost calm while to that Rock I'm clinging.
Since Christ is Lord of heaven and earth,
how can I keep from singing?

What though my joys and comforts

I lift my eyes; the cloud grows thin; I see the blue above it;
And day by day this pathway smooths,
Since first I learned to love it.
The peace of Christ makes fresh my heart,
a fountain ever springing!
All things are mine since I am his!
